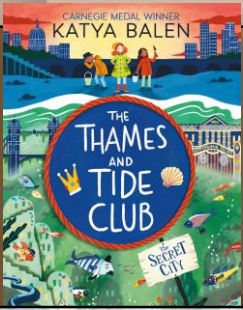


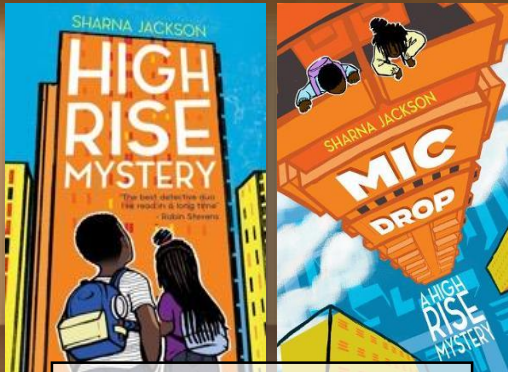

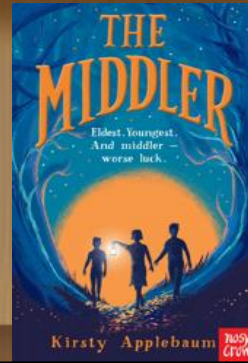
The Thames and Tide Club by Katya Balen

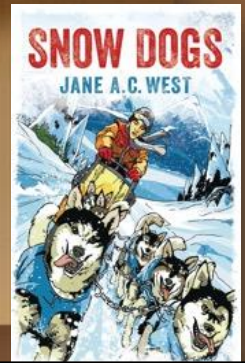

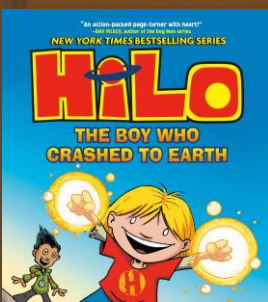
Welcome to Villain's Academy – the most prestigious villain school in the entire land. You will either leave here as a fully-formed villain...or in tatters.

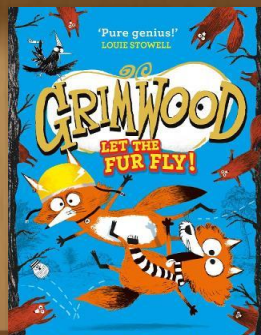

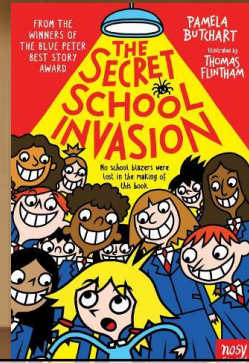

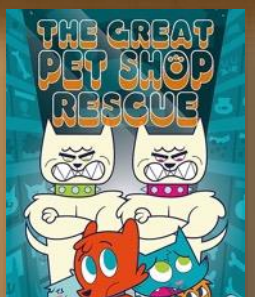

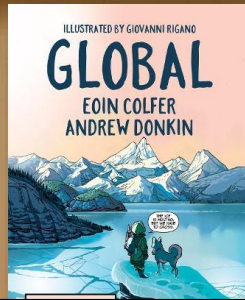

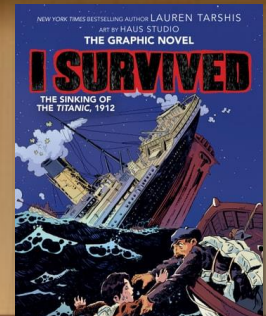
